Present Perfect Simple vs. Continuous Form

- Paco has flown to Kenya.
- Paco has been watching documentaries since he arrived.

Present Perfect Simple:

S + have/has + p. participle

Present Perfect Continuous:

S + have/has + been + verb-ing





Present Perfect Simple vs. Continuous Uses

Present Perfect Simple

- It emphasizes the result of an activity.
- How many times an activity happens.

Present Perfect Continuous

- It emphasizes the process of an activity.
- How long an activity continues.





Modal verbs

It must have been love

Obligation	You must be home by 12 0'clock; You have to hand in your homework; You need to study hard.
Lack of obligation	You needn't have a degree; You don't have to ask for a drink. Help yourself.
Deduction	Look at the snow. It must be very cold.
Prohibition	You mustn't drive faster than 120km/h.

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To be + adjective + preoposition

Paco is excited about the safari

angry, annoyed, furious, excited, worried, upset, enthusiastic, serious	ABOUT
dependent, keen	ON
attached, opposed, related, similar, married	ТО
good, excellent, bad	AT
famous, responsible, sorry	FOR
afraid, aware, capable, fond, guilty, proud	OF
different	FROM
pleased, satisfied, disappointed	WITH
interested	IN

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Be/Get used to + noun/verb-ing

Paco is used to speaking English.

After years in London Pedro got used to drinking tea.
