E.g. Seldom had Paco travelled so long before.

Normal use:

To give emphasis





Inversion in English

After negative adverbial expressions:

Under no circumstances can Paco say he has seen better libraries.

After adverbial expressions of place:

Round the corner was the National Library of Australia.

After seldom, rarely, never, in comparisons:

Rarely did he go to a library but the one at the university.

After hardly, scarcely, no sooner, when one thing happens after another. - Hardly had he begun to walk when he got lost.

After adverbial expressions beginning with 'only' and 'not only'. Not only did he know where to go but also what to do.

After exclamations with here and there.

Here comes Paco!

Conditionals:

 Had Paco known that before he would have taken a plane (If Paco had known that before...)





Multi-word verbs



verbs followed by a particle or two particles (adverb, preposition or adverb and preposition) which function as single verbs





Multi-word verbs

	Particle	Examples
Prepositional verbs	Preposition	to complain about; to look at; to listen to;
Phrasal verbs	Adverb	to act out; to bring up; to break out;
Phrasal- prepositional verbs	Adverb + preposition	to be up to; to come up with; to get out of; to make off with
